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I have created a short book which teaches younger children (and adults) about coastal erosion and how we can help prevent it.

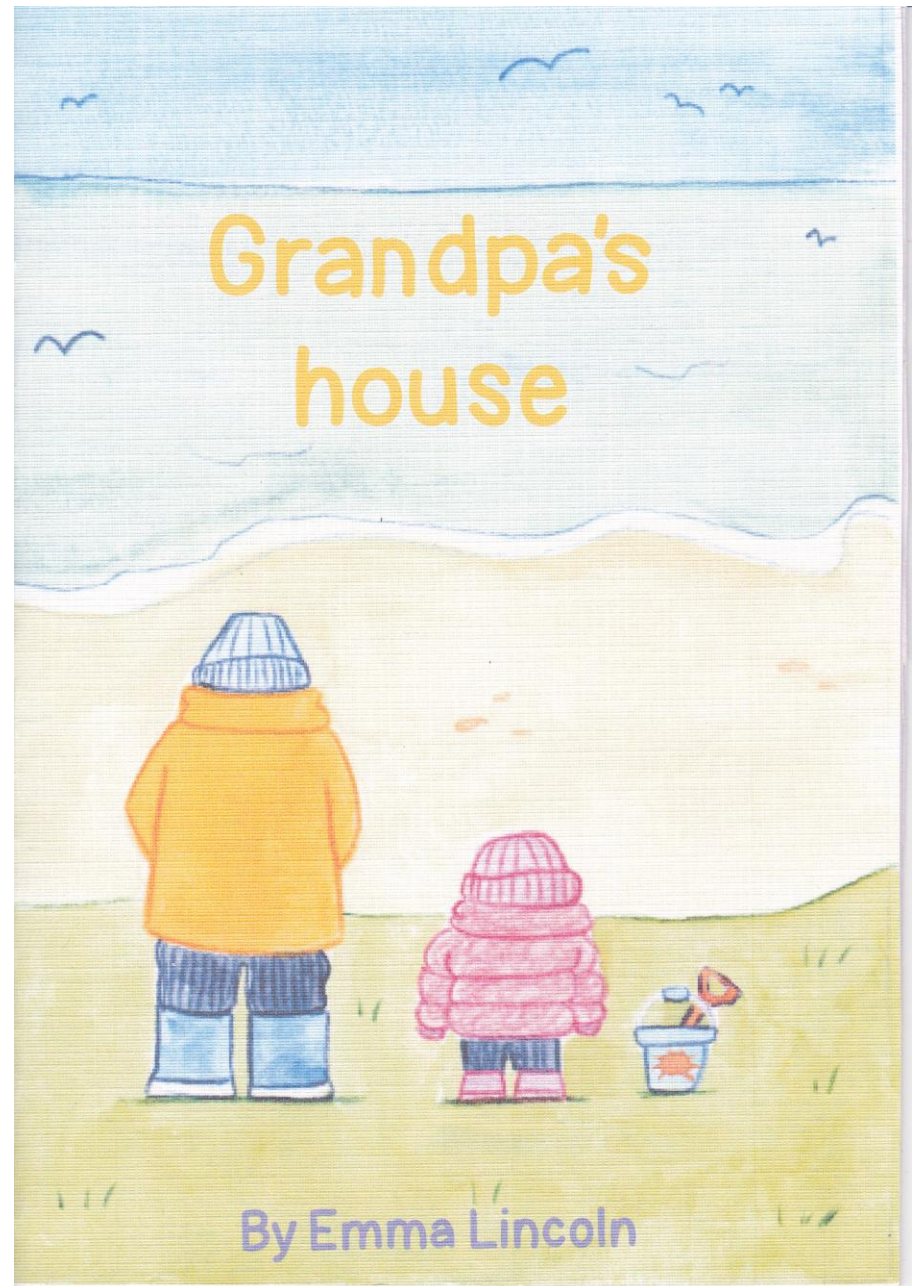
It was inspired by a lifetime spent in Norfolk, with regular visits to the coast!

When Annabelle goes to Grandpa's house, they do lots of fun things - birdwatch through the windows,

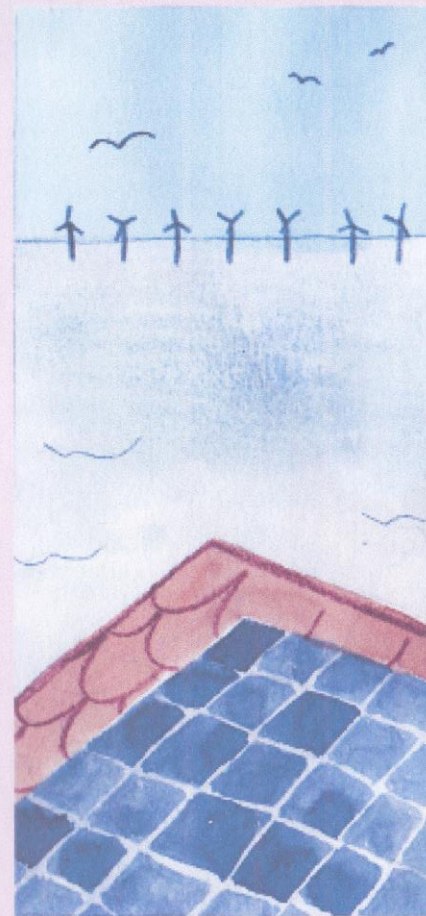
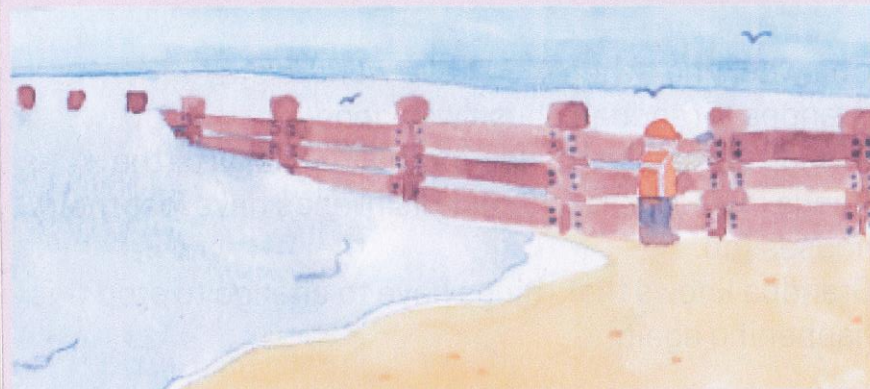


say 'hello' to Grandpa's friends and play on the beach.

This is called 'Sandscaping', it helps the beach to make the waves less strong (so that they can't break the cliffs).

Fixed the old defences

Sea defences can't do their job if they're broken. It's important to make sure they are strong enough to defend against the waves.

How can we all help to make a difference?

Grandpa, Annabelle and their friends know all about Climate Change (changes to the weather which make it harder to live on earth). We can all do our bit to make things better.

We can:

Power our homes with the sun and wind

We can put solar panels on top of our houses or switch to renewable energy providers.


Use less plastic
